- Positive analogy: Life and poker have winners and losers. Negative analogy: Poker is a game played for amusement, life isn't. Neutral analogy: Economic life may not be a zero-sum game (as is poker).
- Positive analogy: Business and war have winners and losers. Negative analogy: Business does not usually involve violence. Neutral analogy: Business may or may not require a "win-it-all" mentality.
- Positive analogy: College and prison both involve certain limitations of freedom. Negative analogy: Prisoners are required to be where they are, students are not. Neutral analogy: College and prison may both make people better.
